NATIVE AMERICAN OFFICE

Student Council is an educational staple. Running for office appears to be very competitive. Becoming a school leader is an important task. Indigenous students do not often participate.



In my years at ACS, approximately 3 students have been involved in Student Council. I've often wondered why they don't get involved because our students always have great ideas on how to make this school a better place!

So why don't they fill out the application packet, write an essay, get recommendations, create campaign posters and solicit votes at lunch tables. . Right!?! Indigenous students, for the most part, do not participate in voting for any office. (That is not to say we can't participate. Some Indigenous people choose to participate in political races and elections.) Our traditional governments at Tonawanda, Onondaga, and Tuscarora continue to use a consensus model for choosing our leaders. The process involves a gathering of minds to make a decision that everyone agrees to. It can be time consuming but it is harmonious. And it is much different than voting. Voting is based on an individual and not the community as a whole. And voting can be done very quickly.

So if the barrier is voting (and the campaigning process) - how do we ensure that Indigenous students have an opportunity to participate in Student Council. Easy! Gather the indigenous students and have them decide a representative to participate - consensus style. We have discussed this with administration and Student Council advisors. It is happening! Indigenous students will be meeting after Easter Break to choose an Ambassador/Runner from each grade in the middle and high school. The Ambassador/Runner will be a life position for the duration of middle or high school. All Indigenous students will be offered a chance to participate in the deliberations. More details will be rolled out to families in early April. This is groundbreaking and very exciting!!

We are looking forward to engaging in the process and fostering leaders in school!

STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES:

It is finally Spring! Springtime allows us to get outside and enjoy the sunshine and fresh air! It also serves as a reminder of the importance of having a schedule to help to make sure we all take time to relax, while still having enough time to complete our homework, our chores and our other responsibilities. Here are some pointers:

- Create a simple schedule for your at home time! Don't forget to schedule some relaxation and fun activities!
- Write your homework down in your Agenda AND don't forget to open your Agenda and read through it at home. Be sure to cross off items once they are completed.
- If you prefer, keeping a written To-Do List is a great visual way to remind yourself of what needs to be completed each day. It is also a super way to feel accomplished as you check those completed items off our list!
